Bamburgh outplay Chatton

On a bright, breezy day in the shadow of the castle, Bamburgh elected to bat first. The pitch was good, and the opening bowlers did well to remove Bamburgh's first two batsmen for single figures. However, their middle order started to consolidate, and gradually became more aggressive. Ausaf Ali, Bamburgh's overseas (United Arab Emirates) player, gave a masterclass in innings building. He batted cautiously for the first half hour, and then started to play more strokes, and eventually scythed his way to 40 before being run out. The middle order thrashed runs, and Chatton were left with a daunting target of 190. Ord was the pick of the bowlers, with two wickets and an economy rate of four an over.

Chatton's top order was ripped out by the opening bowlers, and Bamburgh's crafty spinners, including Sashwari from The Durham Academy, got their share of the wickets too. The innings almost lasted the full 35 overs, but the run rate never bettered two per over, ending on 49. A. Cochrane (with a yawn-inducing 19 in an hour and a half) was the only batsman to reach double figures. Chatton suffered a heavy defeat, losing by 140 runs, but it was wonderful to have played at such a venue, in front of a large number of people, and to have played against an international.
